

under the circumstances. An appeal from this decision may be had by immediately filing a written notice with the hearing officer. This appeal will be heard before the city council at a time and place fixed by the council. The findings of the council shall be conclusive and, if a nuisance is found to exist, it shall be ordered abated within a time reasonable under the circumstances. (Ord. 500 §7, 1968).

8.04.080 Nuisance designated. Whatever is injurious to the senses, or an obstruction to the free use of property, so as essentially to interfere with the comfortable enjoyment of life or property, is a nuisance. Examples of nuisances are:

- A. All animals running at large;
- B. All ponds or pools of stagnant water;
- C. Carcasses of animals not disposed of within twenty-four hours after death as provided by law;
- D. Accumulation of refuse constituting an eye sore, such as, but not limited to, appliances, furniture, yard waste and old machinery;
- E. The pollution of any public well or cistern, stream, lake, canal or body of water by sewage, creamery or industrial wastes, or other substances;
- F. Uncut grass and/or weeds reaching 6" tall upon public or private property;
- G. Dense smoke or odor and noxious fumes;
- H. All snow and ice not removed from public sidewalks twelve hours after the snow or ice has ceased being deposited thereon;
- I. All trees, hedges, billboards or other obstructions which prevent persons from having a clear view of traffic approaching an intersection from cross streets in sufficient time to bring a motor vehicle driven at a reasonable speed to a full stop before the intersection is reached;
- J. All limbs of trees which are less than ten feet above the surface of any public sidewalk, or street;
- K. All utility wires which are strung less than fifteen feet above the surface of the ground;
- L. All buildings, walls, fences, and equipment which have been damaged by fire, in disrepair, or abandoned to an extent exceeding one-half their original value, and which are so situated as to endanger the safety of the public;
- M. All explosives, inflammable liquids and other dangerous substances stored in any manner or in any amount other than that provided by ordinance, if there be such an ordinance;
- N. All use or display of fireworks unless conducted by licensed pyrotechnics;

O. All unnecessary noises, including the squealing of motor vehicle tires;

P. Obstructions and excavations affecting the ordinary use by the public of streets, alleys, sidewalks or public grounds except under such conditions as are provided by ordinance;

Q. Any use of property abutting on a public street or sidewalk or any use of a public street or sidewalk which causes large crowds of people to gather, obstructing traffic and free use of the streets or sidewalks;

R. Trees infected with diseases and all dead trees;

S. Operation or use of any electrical device not licensed, approved or operated under the rules and regulations of the Federal Communications Commission, that causes interference with radio or television reception if the receiver is free from radiations, is selective enough to separate the stations desired, is properly shielded and filtered and is without design or constructional imperfections (Amended during 1979 codification) (Ord. 500, Sec. 8, 1968).

8.04.090 Violation--Penalty. Anyone violating any of the provisions of this chapter shall, upon conviction, be subject to imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars. (Ord. 500, Sec. 9, 1968).
